Support with Homework: Significant Impact

All the evidence suggests that parents who prepare their children well before they start school (they can dress themselves, hold a pencil correctly, they know their own name and age, numbers to 10 and the alphabet) then make time to listen to them read and talk about texts, ask them questions, encourage them to learn their spellings and times tables, support their child consistently with English and Mathematics homework through their primary school life whilst ensuring that they also have good attendance, are far more likely to see their children thrive, achieve well and be successful. This is certainly an investment worth making.

Impact of Children Missing School

When children are absent from school because they are ill, for family personal reasons or if there is a family emergency, this really cannot be helped.

When children are absent for holiday reasons this is not the case. It is avoidable. Whether it is for 1 or more, this absence impacts not only on the child, but on the rest of the class. One day lost is one day's learning that your child will never get back. If your child has an attendance rate of 90%, it actually doesn't seem that bad but if this rate was the average over the child's primary school life, it would mean that he/she loses over 2 full terms of lessons and opportunities. Undoubtedly, this will have a damaging and detrimental affect upon the child's learning, progress, attainment and ultimately their academic confidence. When children are absent, they miss very important work sometimes at the start of a topic. They struggle to understand on their return and this can be distressing. Staff then have to devote extra time (sometimes during lessons and sometimes during their break times and lunch periods) to explain this work once again and ensure that the children understand. This can take hours. Both teachers and their teaching assistants, who should have been working with identified groups and individuals, then can't. These individuals and groups then miss out on important learning and support because other children have been away on holiday. This doesn't seem fair. Could we ask you to think carefully about the impact on your child's learning and that of others, when you are considering taking your child on holiday in term-time. Thanks for your understanding our concerns in this matter.
